

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

Insurance Tips.

Sorry – I cannot remember who sent them to me but thank you for the great advice

Situation;- You have a bike in your shed at home, registered or unregistered, and it is stolen. Is it covered?

If insured separately, no problem. motor bikes, cars, trailers, boats, jetski's, caravans, are normally not classified as contents under a house and policy. Many people think they are if they are unregistered. Some of the better contents policies do in fact cover motor cycles up to 250cc.

Situation;- You have just received new mufflers for your treasured machine, cost \$1000, and they are in the shed, but not yet fitted to the bike. Stolen overnight. Are they covered?

Some policies do not, but most offer some cover. The section of a contents policy is the "un-attached car/bike/boat accessories", that does offer cover. Cover varies from \$500 to \$2000, depending on the policy.Some people have a tinny beside the shed, but keep the fuel tank, depth sounder, gps etc in the shed. Maybe the roof rack for your 4WD. Items must not be fitted to the vehicle, and covered for burglary and fire only.

Situation;- You take you bike to a motorcycle dealer for some work, and leave it there overnight. Premises broken into and your bike is stolen. Is it covered?

If you have it insured yourself, your insurer will pay. If not insured, you are thinking that it is the bike shop's problem. Not so. The dealer has Public Liability insurance, which includes "Customers Goods In his Care and Control. But the Public Liability will only pay if the dealer is found to be negligent If the premises are securely locked to the standard of the industry, the insurer may find the bike shop owner, "not negligent", and not pay the claim. The yelling and shouting starts about now. Be warned.

Situation;- On a road trip, stop at a servo/café for a drink and a chicko roll, leaving your helmet, gloves, \$500 jacket and \$200 sun glasses on the bike. While in the toilet a local lad becomes the new owner of your gear.

Some of the better bike insurance policies, like QBE Western for example cover your riding gear. Imagine if you have a pillion with the same gear. If no bike insurance, the better house/contents policies cover your contents away from home, anywhere in Australia & New Zealand. Your riding gear is classified as contents. Same applies if your swag blew out of the back of a ute, (contents also). Not that this could ever happen!
