THE EDITORS Ravings



BURDEKIN FALLS 3 DAY RUN - 18TH, 19TH & 20TH FEBRUARY 2011

Ten Riders assembled at the Shell Northside Roadhouse on Friday morning and left for our overnight stop at the Railway Hotel in Ravenswood. The day was sunny and warm at the start.

At the first fuel stop at Bowen, it was decided to stop at Inkerman Lookout for the view

and then proceed to the best Pie shop in North Queensland (Ayr) for lunch. After lunch the temperature was rising and the pace was stepped up due to the developing thirst, stopping at the Mingela Pub for much needed refreshment and the call of nature. Comment was made, you're better off using the trees across the road for there is more cover there than in the outhouse. This was due to Cyclone Ului blowing out the walls leaving only the front wall and door standing.



Conditions had turned quite muggy and was a relief to arrive at the Ravenswood

Railway Hotel (The Snake Pit). Our hostess said to park the bikes under the back of the pub or in the beer garden. A covered, concrete floor in the beer garden proved excellent parking. 




